Human Rights and Housing Fights: Exploring government responses to homelessness and encampments

Tuesday, February 13 (10:30 AM - 12:00 PM)

This lecture will discuss the legal and legislative basis for the right to housing in Canada. It will explore how the right to housing has been discussed in international human rights covenants as well as through domestic legal and political mechanisms. Finally, the lecture will explore the implications of a right to housing lens for government responses to homelessness and encampments.

Instructor Bio Dr Laura Pin (she/her) is an assistant professor of political science at Wilfrid Laurier University, and acting director of the Laurier Institute for the Study of Public Opinion and Policy (LISPOP). Her research explores the relationship between social inequality and public policy. She currently works on projects focused on housing policy, civic engagement, eviction prevention and encampments.
